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INTRODUCTION

PRESENTATION

I would like to take you on a journey through the first history book of the Christian church, the Book of Acts. I suggest that you start by reading in the sequence of the author, the doctor Luke:

- 1. The Gospel of Luke
- 2. The Book of Acts

Then, we can start to study the details.

The book of Acts was written about 75 AD. It reflects the first 30 years of the church which were full of drama and expansion. We take a voyage of discovery from approximately year 30 to 60, together with Peter and Paul, who are some of the central characters in the book of Acts. The journey starts in Jerusalem, via Judea and Samaria, all the way to the capital of the Roman Empire, Rome, yes, to the ends of the earth (*Acts 1:8*).

BACKGROUND

The Gospels give us a picture of Jesus, whom we love, follow and wish to be like. The Book of Acts reflects a healthy church life and gives a pattern for you, me, and all other disciples that are willing to allow the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit in their lives. Jesus actually said that we would do the same things He did and even greater (*John 14:12*). In the second chapter of Acts, this promise is fulfilled, and Jesus is multiplying Himself by the baptism of the Holy Spirit (*Acts 1:5, 2:1-4*). Thus starts the age of the church. The Book of Acts is still invaluable for the Christians in the modern age; invaluable as a pattern for all Christian life, as well as church-building. Therefore, let's take time to study a detailed documentation of a church life that is perfectly possible today, and let's do this without any religious preconceived ideas.

THE VISION

The vision behind this "discipleship training school" is that we want to train and equip you to become a self-supporting Christian with a holy and healthy self-confidence. The idea is to train, raise, and foster newly saved people in order to be able to follow up our future evangelization initiatives. "The Shepherd does not give birth to any lambs, but the sheep do. The Shepherd leads the sheep." (David Yonggi Cho). We will study the first Christians in regard to: preaching, baptism in water, baptism in the Holy Spirit, the healing ministry, the ministry of deliverance, prayer and fasting, the building of the church, leadership, having all possessions in common, etc. If you, like Peter, make the Holy Spirit your best friend, I am convinced that your everyday life will be marked by the visitation of angels, revelations, and the salvation of friends. In recent years this has really been a part of my everyday life. I wish to share this experience, but above all I want to introduce you to the main character of the Book of Acts: The Holy Spirit. The Book of Acts is really the book of the Holy Spirit! For those of you who wish to become practical, anointed, and ordinary disciples -

PART_1

PATTERNS OF REVIVAL IN THE BOOK OF ACTS

INTRODUCTION

A study of the first church, the book of Acts - the first history book of the Christian church.

Author

Luke, a Christian doctor of gentile origin, with a Greek reputation that indicates advanced education. Luke has also written the Gospel of Luke, which means that the Book of Acts is part two in his series. During a period of time he was also part of the team that traveled with Paul, and thereby had personal experience with some of the things that are depicted in the Book of Acts.

Date

About 70 AD. (The book of Acts depicts slightly more than the first 30 years of the church.)

Recipient

Theophilus, a man with possible high official position and status in the Roman Empire. Before writing, Luke carefully researched and studied every detail from the beginning.

Purpose

To depict the triumphal procession of the gospel from Jerusalem (and the Jews) through Samaria and out to the entire world including all the gentile nations (*Acts 1:8*). In the first part of the Gospel of Luke, he writes about "all that Jesus did and taught". In part two of Acts, Luke writes about everything that Jesus is doing and teaching, but this time through the Holy Spirit, the believers and the church. The Book of Acts tells us about the success of the Good News, "the great triumphal procession."

Suggestions

- Study the first church together, read the book of Luke and the book of Acts during your daily Bible reading.
- Pray before you start your studies, so that the main character of the Book of Acts, the Holy Spirit, can guide you.
- Study without any preconceived ideas and allow the Holy Spirit to give you a renewed picture of Jesus, yourself, the life in the church, and the possibilities in your environment. Remember that the first Christians were totally dependent on

the Old Testament and the Holy Spirit. Everything was new, fresh, and exciting!

PATTERNS OF MOVEMENT OR "REVIVAL" ACCORDING TO THE BOOK OF ACTS

The book of Acts gives a model for the movement around preaching the Gospel by a believer in a specific place.

Let's focus on the movement in two cities:

- 1. Samaria, the capital of Samaria, Acts 8:5-24
- 2. Ephesus in Asia Minor (Turkey), Acts 19

When the revival had passed through Jerusalem like a firestorm, it spread due to persecution. First to Samaria through Philip, the evangelist, and then later on to Asia Minor through Paul. The following seven points are found in the movements in Jerusalem, Samaria, and Asia Minor. They can be seen as a model and standard for true biblical revival:

- Teaching focused on Jesus "The Messiah of the Scriptures is here!" Acts 8:5, 12, 19:4b,8
- Baptism in water in connection to salvation Acts 8:12, 19:1-5
- Baptism in the Holy Spirit Power for ministry Acts 8:14-17, 19:6
- Prayer for the sick Healing ministry Acts 8:6-8, 13, 19:11-12
- Deliverance from evil spirits Ministry of deliverance Acts 8:7, 19:12-17
- Persecution from the religious people and the world in various shapes and forms

Acts 8:1-3, 19:9, 23-40

► The occult is exposed and the satanic network disappears *Acts* 8:18-23, 19:13-20

START SPREADING THE KINGDOM OF GOD!

PREACHING OF THE FIRST CHRISTIANS

INTRODUCTION

The preaching of the first Christians - "the Messiah of the scriptures is here."

To preach is to shortly and simply, proclaim a message. To teach is to thoroughly explain. Let's separate preaching from teaching.

A high Roman official was always preceded by a crier or a herald. When the herald came to town, the people knew that a highly placed person was coming. The herald prepared the people to receive someone of importance and created great expectations.

Several hundred years before the arrival of Jesus, the prophets Isaiah and Malachi spoke of a messenger that would come and make way for Jesus just before He entered the scene. He came and we know him from the Gospels as John the Baptist. John was the last prophet after Malachi, and he also saw the Messiah (the Anointed One). John said, "He will baptize in the Holy Spirit and with fire" (*Matthew 3:11*). John was a typical herald of his day (*Acts 19:4*). The first Christians were also heralds, but with far more potential than John ever had. They were baptized in fire!

Preaching in the book of Acts

In the book of Acts, there are about 10 sermons, parts of sermons, or speeches of defense mainly by Peter and Paul; but also by Stephen, Philip, and Apollo. You will find the sermons of the first Christians in *Acts 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, 13, 17, 18, 20, 22, 23, 24, 26, 28.* I encourage you to make a Bible study of your own.

TESTIFY

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Acts 1:8

Today, most testimonies are given in a courtroom. A testimony should be:

- ► Explanatory
- ► Exemplifying
- ► Self-Experienced
- ► Convincing

This means that it must be honest and go straight to the point. To preach is to testify about Jesus in an uncomplicated way. The preachings of the first Christians were not topical sermons, but concrete messages - verified evidence that Jesus was alive. Therefore, you can preach!

PREACHING

Let's study one of the sermons of Peter, namely the one he held in the house of the Roman centurion, Cornelius (*Acts 10:34-48*). All sermons depicted in the book of Acts have the following four points in common. You can see these points as a pattern for a correct New Testament sermon.

- Quotations from the prophecies about Jesus in the Old Testament Explanatory - Acts 10:43
- Jesus as he revealed Himself
 Exemplifying Acts 10:36-38
- ► Their personal experience Experience - Acts 10:39-42
- The promise of the Holy Spirit, Jesus in us Convincing - Acts 10:44-48

PART 3 BAPTISM IN WATER - A PART OF SALVATION

INTRODUCTION

The direct translation of the Greek word for baptism, baptisma or baptiz \bar{o} , means to dip in paint, to drown, or to sink a ship.

COMMAND

Jesus commanded his disciples to make new disciples by baptizing them in water (*Matthew 28:18-20*). He also explained that baptism was an inseparable part of repentance, the salvation (*Mark 16:15-16, John 3:5*).

MEANING

The meaning of baptism in water is explained to us by the two central characters in the Book of Acts, Peter and Paul.

BAPTISM IN THE BOOK OF ACTS:

There are nine occasions of baptism described in the book of Acts. Peter, Philip, Ananias, and Paul are who performed the baptisms on these occasions. Perhaps the other eleven apostles were baptizing as well.

PRACTICAL QUESTIONS:

Let's study one case of repentance and baptism in the book of Acts: Philip and the Ethiopian eunuch. (*Acts 8:26-39*).

When does baptism take place in the first church?

- 1. Directly after repentance and salvation (*Acts 8:36*). Paul is the exception in (*Acts 9*).
- 2. When there is faith, the baptism can take place (*Acts 8:37* This verse is excluded in some translations).

How is baptism performed?

- 1. Through immersion in water (Acts 8:38-39)
- 2. In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit or in the name of Jesus. (*Matthew 28:19, Acts 19:5*)

Who performs the baptism?

All disciples. In *Acts 8* it is Philip, one of the deacons from Jerusalem that is baptizing straight from the soup kitchen (*Acts 6:1-5*).

Where does baptism take place?

Anywhere the water is deep enough to allow immersion.

START BAPTIZING IN THE NAME OF JESUS!

BAPTISM IN THE HOLY SPIRIT - POWER FOR MINISTRY

INTRODUCTION

John, the forerunner of Jesus, says in all four Gospels that he is baptizing in water, but when the Messiah comes He will baptize with the Holy Spirit and with fire.

▶ Matthew 3:11 ▶ Mark 1:8 ▶ Luke 3:16 ▶ John 1:33

JESUS

On several occasions Jesus talks to His disciples about the Helper - the Spirit of Truth, the Holy Spirit - that will come in His place after His death, resurrection, and ascension. The plan of Jesus was to multiply Himself and send out the disciples on the same mission. The Greek word for Helper, parakletos, means "someone that assists in stirring up an army."

▶ Luke 24:49 ▶ John 15:26, 16:13-15 ▶ Acts 1:5, 8

BAPTISM OF THE HOLY SPIRIT IN THE BOOK OF ACTS

Jesus wants to totally cover us with His Spirit. In the same way a person is covered by water at the time of baptism in water. This is what it means to become baptized in the Holy Spirit. It is possible to go to heaven just by faith in Jesus, but it is impossible to serve Him here on earth without being clothed with power from on high. The Book of Acts describes six occasions where people were baptized in, or filled with, the Holy Spirit, mostly in connection to repentance and baptism in water.

PRACTICAL QUESTIONS

Let's study the examples of baptism in the Holy Spirit from the Book of Acts.

When did the baptism in the Holy Spirit take place in the first church?

- ▶ Immediately in connection to repentance and water baptism (Acts 19:5-6)
- ▶ In response to eager and persevering prayer (*Acts 2:1-4, 4:31, 8:14-16*)

- ▶ In connection to preaching the Word (*Acts 10:43-46*)
- ► Through the apostle's hands, a transmission of power (*Acts 8:17, 9:17-18*)

What was the experience like?

- ► In the Book of Acts, no baptism in the Holy Spirit is like another. The Holy Spirit is sovereign!
- Everyone has an experience, but it is individual and unique for each one of the disciples.

SPEAKING IN TONGUES:

The gift of speaking in tongues is written in plural in the original text. There are at least 3 ways of speaking in tongues - one for personal edification and two prophetic purposes.

Does everyone speak in tongues when they are baptized in the Holy Spirit?

- 1. Most of the time, this specific spiritual gift was released at the time of baptism in the Holy Spirit. In *Acts 19*, the disciples were prophesying as well. My experience is that 99% of people start speaking in tongues.
- 2. You cannot speak in tongues without being baptized in the Holy Spirit, but it is possible to be baptized in the Holy Spirit without having started to speak in tongues yet. If you have not started speaking in tongues, or are unsure if you have been baptized in the Holy Spirit, simply ask God for this gift, receive it in faith, and begin to speak!

Can everyone speak in tongues?

- Yes, everyone can speak the type of tongues for personal edification (Mark 16:17)
- ▶ Not everyone speaks in prophetic tongues (1 Corinthians 12:10, 30)

Why should someone speak in tongues?

- It builds up our spiritual life and makes us strong in faith (1 Corinthians 14:2, 4, 18)
- It helps us in prayer when we do not know how to pray (*Romans 8:26, Jude 20*)

Advice when using the gift of speaking in tongues

- ▶ Speak in tongues often (1 Corinthians 14:18. 39-40)
- Pray that you will get the gift of interpretation, so that you can build up others (1 Corinthians 14:5, 12-13, 19, 26)

ASK, RECEIVE, AND SPEAK!

PART 5 HOUSE CHURCH - THE HEART OF THE FIRST CHURCH

INTRODUCTION

The gathering of believers was such a big part of the book of Acts that if every reference was listed, it would cover more than half the book. Let's look at the three types of gatherings of believers with just a few examples recorded throughout the Book of Acts.

THREE TYPES OF MEETINGS

- ► Mass-meetings, large gatherings, etc.: These were often spontaneous due to an outpouring of the Holy Spirit (*Acts 2:1-41*), a miracle (*Acts 3:1-4:4*), or persecution (*Acts 21:27-22:21*).
- Apostles' teachings: Believers would gather for the apostles teachings such as in Solomon's Colonnade at the temple in Jerusalem (*Acts 5:12-16*). When the apostles traveled to a new city they would start by teaching in the synagogues, but if they were rejected, they would begin teaching in public places (*Acts 19:8-10*).
- ► House meetings: These were really the heart of the first church. It was a forum for prayer, fellowship, the functioning of the spiritual gifts, simple teaching, worship, natural evangelism, the raising of disciples, and so on (*Acts 12:12*).

ARCHAEOLOGICAL FACTS

According to archaeological findings, the first known church building can be dated back to 160 AD. This means that it took Christians 130 years of expansive church life before they started meeting in church buildings.

The first 30 years of the first church were extremely expansive and it is believed that the churches of Jerusalem, Ephesus, and Rome each had at least 50,000 members around 60 AD. The natural question is: Where did all these Christians most often meet for teaching, fellowship, the breaking of the bread, and prayer? The home was the natural meeting place for church-life (*Acts 2:41-47*).

HOUSE CHURCHES IN ROME

When the apostle Paul writes to the Christians in Rome, he ends his letter by sending greetings to some of the specific house churches, which constituted the enormous congregation (*Romans 16:3-5, 10, 11, 14, 15*).

PRACTICAL QUESTIONS

How did a house church start?

It was born spontaneously and was therefore naturally homogeneous.

Who was the leader of this house church?

- The natural leader, often the owner of the house
- Someone that had been a believer for some time (longer than the others)

How large were the house churches?

- This of course varied depending of the size of the home, but it was also related to which class of society the people belonged to
- ▶ It could be between 2-30 people (8-12 was very good).

Did the house churches evangelize?

- Of course, that is how they were born.
- ► The right for a house-church to exist depended on if it evangelized or not.

Did the house church ever split?

- ► Yes, often spontaneously due to lack of space
- Assuming there was a mature leader for a new home-church.

If house church is so important, should I leave my church to start a house church?

No! But if a church building on Sunday is the only place you encounter God, then maybe it's time you start thinking about your home as a church too.

WORD STUDY

- 4. Fill up the empty space Matthew 12:43-45, Luke 11:24-26

PRACTICAL QUESTIONS

Who can deliver?

The Great Commission concerns everyone. It includes driving out demons. *Mark 16:17*

What does it mean to "have covering"?

To know your position in Christ. Ephesians 1:17-23, Colossians 1:27, Colossians 2:9-10

Which weapons are available for effective deliverance ministry? (2 Corinthians 10:4-6)

- ▶ Purity and humbleness before God James 4:7-8, Proverbs 28:1
- ▶ Prayer and fasting *Mark* 9:29
- ▶ Insight into the Word *Luke 4:4,8,12*

Do we need to be worried when we are delivering someone?

No, provided that we are:

- ▶ Pure and humble 1 John 1:7, 4:4, Acts 19:13-17, Jude 9
- ► Living in the Fire of the Holy Spirit *Acts* 28:3-5

PRAYER AND FASTING

The first Christian fellowship with the Helper, the Holy Spirit, was just as natural as the earlier fellowship with the Master - Jesus - had been. Prayer was the natural way through which the disciples communicated with the Helper. Prayer was the way to breath, the source, and the key to everything that was done by the first Christians. Prayer and fasting is a way of living!

After baptism in water and in the Holy Spirit, Jesus fasted 40 days before He started His ministry on earth. The disciples did not fast as long as the bridegroom, Jesus, was among them. They did not do it until after His death and resurrection.

INTRODUCTION

Jesus, the son of God, came from well-organized leadership in heaven and gave us an excellent example of leadership and discipleship training on earth.

Despite all this, I doubt that any honest Christian of today would dare to question the leadership-qualifications of the Master.

Who is a leader?

The natural (in a spiritual sense) leaders who are called and equipped by God. They must have the leadership qualifications as stated above and bear spiritual fruit, which will confirm the ministry. It is important that a leader is confirmed and ordained before entering his task.

Can leadership be questioned and removed?

God and the Bible stand above all earthly leadership, and therefore leadership can be tested in relation to the Word of God. It is possible for a leader to forfeit their qualifications by falling in different areas. After repentance and confession, it is possible to receive new confidence and a new commission. However, a spiritual leader cannot be questioned or removed on any other grounds than direct rebellion against the Word of God.

The first church did not work by methods of evangelism or according to models of church growth or well-tested methods from other fields of revival. Every step and every move was new. Every move was a new spiritual adventure. The first Christians were neither charismatic robots, nor religious cows stuck up to their bellies in dung. They always did that which they had never done before. Sometimes, they failed but their wish was always to be sovereignly led by the Holy Spirit. They had an enormous inventiveness and people were saved by the thousands.

DIVERSITY OF EVANGELISM

The first Christians were fully occupied in increasing the Kingdom of God (they thought "thoughts of the Kingdom"). They were waiting and precipitating the return of King Jesus to Jerusalem. They were not driven by any shrewd strategies, but by their love for Jesus. They became channels for the Holy Spirit.
